



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

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Before Use

Safety Precautions

- Before using the product, ensure that you read the safety precautions. described below. Always ensure that the product is used correctly.
- The safety precautions noted here are intended to prevent you and other persons from being injured or incurring property damage.
- Be sure to also check the guides included with any separately sold. accessories you use.

Warning Denotes the possibility of serious injury or death.

Do not trigger the flash in close proximity to people's eyes.

Exposure to the intense light produced by the flash could damage evesight. In particular, remain at least 1 meter (3.3 feet) away from infants when using the flash.

 Store this equipment out of the reach of children and infants. A strap wound around a child's neck may result in asphyxiation. If your product uses a power cord, mistakenly winding the cord around a child's neck may result in asphyxiation.

- Use only recommended power sources.
- Do not disassemble, alter, or apply heat to the product,
- Avoid dropping or subjecting the product to severe impacts.
- Do not touch the interior of the product if it is broken, such as when dropped.
- Stop using the product immediately if it emits smoke or a strange smell, or otherwise behaves abnormally.
- Do not use organic solvents such as alcohol, benzine, or thinner to clean the product.
- Avoid contact with liquid, and do not allow liquid or foreign objects inside.

This could result in electrical shock or fire.

If the product gets wet, or if liquid or foreign objects get inside, remove the battery pack/batteries or unplug immediately.

- Be careful not to subject the screen to strong impacts. If the screen cracks, injury may result from the broken fragments.
- When using the flash, be careful not to cover it with your fingers or clothing.

This could result in burns or damage to the flash.

- Avoid using, placing, or storing the product in the following places:
- Places subject to direct sunlight
- Places subject to temperatures above 40 °C (104 °F)
- Humid or dusty places

These could cause leakage, overheating, or an explosion of the battery pack/batteries, resulting in electrical shock, fire, burns, or other injuries. Overheating and damage may result in electrical shock, fire, burns, or other injuries.

- The slideshow transition effects may cause discomfort when viewed for prolonged periods.
- When using optional lenses, lens filters, or filter adapters (if applicable), be sure to attach these accessories firmly.

If the lens accessory becomes loose and falls off, it may crack, and the shards of glass may lead to cuts.

• On products that raise and lower the flash automatically, make sure to avoid pinching your fingers with the lowering flash.

This could result in injury.

- When using the camera on a sandy beach or at a windy location, be careful not to allow dust or sand to enter the camera.

 Wipe off any dust, grime, or other foreign matter on the flash with a cotton swab or cloth.

The heat emitted from the flash may cause foreign matter to smoke or the product to malfunction.

 Remove and store the battery pack/batteries when you are not using the product.

Any battery leakage that occurs may cause product damage.

• Before you discard the battery pack/batteries, cover the terminals with tape or other insulators.

Contacting other metal materials may lead to fire or explosions.

• Unplug any battery charger used with the product when not in use. Do not cover with a cloth or other objects when in use.

Leaving the unit plugged in for a long period of time may cause it to overheat and distort, resulting in fire.

· Do not leave any dedicated battery packs near pets.

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

Initial Preparations

Prepare for shooting as follows.

Attaching the Strap




Thread the end of the strap through the strap hole (1), and then pull the other end of the strap through the loop on the threaded end (2).

- When shooting, keep your arms close to your body and hold the camera securely to prevent it from moving. Do not rest vour fingers on the flash.

Charging the Battery Pack

Insert the battery pack.

After aligning the A marks on the battery pack and charger, insert the battery pack by pushing it in (1) and down (2).

Charge the battery pack.

- CB-2LF: Flip out the plug (1) and plug the charger into a power outlet (2).
- CB-2LFE: Plug the power cord into the charger, then plug the other end into a power outlet.
- The charging lamp turns orange, and charging begins.
- When charging is finished, the lamp turns areen.

3 Remove the battery pack.

After unplugging the battery charger, remove the battery pack by pushing it in (1) and up (2).

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- To protect the battery pack and keep it in optimal condition, do not charge it continuously for more than 24 hours.
- For battery chargers that use a power cord, do not attach the charger or cord to other objects. Doing so could result in malfunction or damage to the product.
- · For details on charging time and the number of shots and recording time possible with a fully charged battery pack, see "Number of Shots/Recording Time, Playback Time" (112).
- Charged battery packs gradually lose their charge, even when they are not used. Charge the battery pack on (or immediately before) the day of use.
- The charger can be used in areas with 100 240 V AC power (50/60 Hz). For power outlets in a different format, use a commercially available adapter for the plug. Never use an electrical transformer designed for traveling, which may damage the battery pack.

Inserting the Battery Pack and Memory Card

Insert the included battery pack and a memory card (sold separately). Note that before using a new memory card (or a memory card formatted in another device), you should format the memory card with this camera (276).







Setting the Date and Time

Set the current date and time correctly as follows if the [Date/Time] screen is displayed when you turn the camera on. Information you specify this way is recorded in image properties when you shoot, and it is used when you manage images by shooting date or print images showing the date. You can also add a date stamp to shots, if you wish (234).

Trying the Camera Out

Follow these instructions to turn the camera on, shoot still images or movies, and then view them.

Shooting (Smart Auto)

For fully automatic selection of the optimal settings for specific scenes. simply let the camera determine the subject and shooting conditions.

Turn the camera on

- Press the power button.
- The startup screen is displayed.

Enter [AUTO] mode.

- Press the <A> button several times until [ALITO] is displayed.
- Aim the camera at the subject. The camera will make a slight clicking noise as it determines the scene

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Icons representing the scene and image stabilization mode are displayed in the upper right of the screen.

FI PH 135 IXUS 145

- A scene icon is displayed in the upper right of the screen.
- Frames displayed around any detected subjects indicate that they are in focus.

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Compose the shot.

 To zoom in and enlarge the subject, move the zoom lever toward <[4]> (telephoto), and to zoom away from the subject, move it toward <[4]> (wide angle).

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

- Press the shutter button all the way down.
- As the camera shoots, a shutter sound is played, and in low-light conditions, the flash fires automatically.
- Keep the camera still until the shutter sound ends.
- After displaying your shot, the camera will revert to the shooting screen.





Viewing

After shooting images or movies, you can view them on the screen as follows

Erasing Images

You can choose and erase unneeded images one by one. Be careful when erasing images, because they cannot be recovered.

- Erase the image.
- Press the <A> button.
- After [Erase?] is displayed, press the <<>>> buttons to choose [Erase], and then press the $\langle (SE) \rangle$ button.
- The current image is now erased.
- To cancel erasure, press the <4><>> buttons to choose [Cancel], and then press the <(Funct)> button.





Movies are identified by a [SET ►] icon. To play movies, go to step 3.

Accessing the Help Menu

Access on-screen descriptions of scenes detected by the camera, shooting advice, and playback instructions as follows.







- Press the <?> button to access the Help menu.
- Press the <?> button again to return to the original display.
- In Shooting mode, a description of the scene detected by the camera is displayed. Shooting advice is also displayed depending on the scene.
- In Playback mode, press the <▲><▼> buttons and choose an item. The zoom lever and buttons are displayed overlaying the illustration of the camera.
- Choose an item and press the <>> button. An explanation of the item is displayed. To continue reading the explanation, press the <▲><▼> buttons to scroll up or down the screen. Press the <◀> button to return to the left hand screen.

• The Help menu can also be used in shooting modes other than [AUTO], and in those modes it will display the same as when in Playback mode.

As a way to conserve battery power, the camera automatically deactivates the screen (Display Off) and then turns itself off after a specific period of


To ensure your shots are in focus, always begin by holding the shutter button halfway down, and once the subject is in focus, press the button all the way down to shoot.

In this manual, shutter button operations are described as pressing the button halfway or all the way down.



Press halfway. (Press lightly to focus.)


Press the shutter button halfway. The camera beeps twice, and AF frames are displayed around image areas in focus.



- Press all the way down. (From the halfway position, press fully to shoot.)
- The camera shoots, as a shutter sound is plaved.
- Keep the camera still until the shutter sound ends
- Images may be out of focus if you shoot without initially pressing the shutter button halfway.
 - Length of shutter sound playback varies depending on the time required for the shot. It may take longer in some shooting scenes. and images will be blurry if you move the camera (or the subject moves) before the shutter sound ends.

Shooting Display Options

Press the $< \mathbf{\nabla} >$ button to view other information on the screen, or to hide the information. For details on the information displayed, see "On-Screen Information" ($\square 103$).





No information is displayed

- Screen brightness is automatically increased by the night view function when you are shooting under low light, making it easier to check how shots are composed. However, on-screen image brightness may not match the brightness of your shots. Note that any on-screen image distortion or jerky subject motion will not affect recorded images.

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Using the FUNC. Menu

Configure commonly used functions through the FUNC. menu as follows. Note that menu items and options vary depending on the shooting mode ($\prod 106 - 107$) or playback mode ($\prod 110$).

On-Screen Frames

A variety of frames are displayed once the camera detects subjects you are aiming the camera at.

 A white frame is displayed around the subject (or person's face) determined by the camera to be the main subject, and gray frames are displayed around other detected faces. Frames follow moving subjects within a certain range to keep them in focus.

However, if the camera detects subject movement, only the white frame will remain on the screen.

• When you are pressing the shutter button halfway and the camera detects subject movement, a blue frame is displayed, and the focus and image brightness are constantly adjusted (Servo AF).

When distant subjects are too far away to enlarge using optical zoom, use digital zoom for up to about 40x (ELPH 150 IS IXUS 155) or 32x (ELPH 140 IS IXUS 150 (ELPH 135) (XUS 145)) enlargement.

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



Correcting Image Brightness (i-Contrast)

Before shooting, excessively bright or dark image areas (such as faces or backgrounds) can be detected and automatically adjusted to the optimal brightness. Insufficient overall image contrast can also be automatically corrected before shooting to make subjects stand out better.

- Image protection settings may be cleared from images saved to a computer.
- Some problems may occur when saving images or image information, depending on the operating system version, the software in use, or image file sizes.
- Some functions provided by the software may not be available, such as movie editing.

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Printing Images

Your shots can easily be printed by connecting the camera to a printer. On the camera, you can specify images to set up batch printing, prepare orders for photo development services, and prepare orders or print images for photobooks.

A Canon SELPHY CP series compact photo printer is used here for the sake of illustration. Screens displayed and available functions varv by printer. Also refer to the printer manual for additional information.

Using an Eye-Fi Card

Before using an Eye-Fi card, always confirm that local use is permitted (2).

Still Images

Inserting a prepared Eye-Fi card enables automatic wireless transfer of images to a computer or uploading to a photo-sharing website. Images are transferred by the Eye-Fi card. Refer to the card's user manual or contact the manufacturer for instructions on preparing and using cards or resolving transfer problems.

- When using an Eye-Fi card, keep the following points in mind.
 Cards may continue to transmit radio waves even when [Eye-Fi trans.] is set to [Disable] (197). Remove the Eye-Fi card before entering hospitals, aircraft, or other areas where transmission is prohibited.
 - When troubleshooting image transfer issues, check the card and computer settings. For details, refer to the card's user manual.
 - Poor Eye-Fi connections may cause image transfer to take a long time, and transfer may be interrupted in some cases.
 - Eye-Fi cards may become hot, due to their transfer functions.
 - Battery power will be consumed faster than in normal use.
 - Camera operation may become sluggish. To resolve this, try setting [Eye-Fi trans.] to [Disable].

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Connection status of Eye-Fi cards in the camera can be checked on the shooting screen (in regular information display mode) or playback screen (in simple information display mode).

Troubleshooting

If you think there is a problem with the camera, first check the following. If the items below do not solve your problem, contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk.

Power

Nothing happens when the power button is pressed.

- Confirm that the battery pack is charged ([11]).
- Confirm that the battery pack is inserted facing the correct way (112).
- Confirm that the memory card/battery cover is fully closed (213).
- Dirty battery terminals reduce battery performance. Try cleaning the terminals with a cotton swab and reinserting the battery pack a few times.

The battery pack runs out of power quickly.

- Battery performance decreases at low temperatures. Try warming the battery pack a little by putting it in your pocket, for example, ensuring that the terminals do not touch any metal objects.
- If these measures do not help and the battery pack still runs out of power soon after charging, it has reached the end of its life. Purchase a new battery pack.

The lens is not retracted.

 Do not open the memory card/battery cover while the camera is on. Close the cover, turn the camera on, and then turn it off again (113).

The battery pack is swollen.

• Battery swelling is normal and does not pose any safety concerns. However, if battery swelling prevents the battery pack from fitting in the camera, contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk.

Display on a TV

Camera images look distorted or not displayed on a TV (284).

Shooting

Cannot shoot.

In Playback mode (^[]₁61), press the shutter button halfway (^[]₂21).

Strange display on the screen under low light (21).

Strange display on the screen when shooting.

Note that the following display problems are not recorded in still images but are recorded in movies.

- · The screen may darken under bright light.
- The screen may flicker under fluorescent or LED lighting.
- Purplish banding may appear on the screen if you compose a shot that includes a bright light source.

No date stamp is added to images.

- Configure the [Date Stamp 🖓] (434) setting. Note that date stamps are not added to images automatically, merely because you have configured the [Date/Time] setting (413).
- Date stamps are not added in shooting modes (109) in which this setting cannot be configured (134).

[4] flashes on the screen when the shutter button is pressed, and shooting is not possible ([28]).

[0] is displayed when the shutter button is pressed halfway (28).

- Set the flash mode to [\$] (156).
- Increase the ISO speed (<u>150</u>).
- Mount the camera on a tripod or take other measures to keep it still.

Set [IS Mode] to [Continuous] (<u>159</u>). However, you should set [IS Mode] to [Off] when using a tripod or other means to secure the camera (<u>159</u>).

Shots are out of focus.

- Press the shutter button halfway to focus on subjects before pressing it all the way down to shoot (^[2]₂₁).
- Make sure subjects are within focusing range (114).
- Set [Lamp Setting] to [On] (238).
- · Confirm that unneeded functions such as macro are deactivated.
- Try shooting with focus lock or AF lock (¹⁵⁴, 56).

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No AF frames are displayed and the camera does not focus when the shutter button is pressed halfway.

 To have AF frames displayed and the camera focus correctly, try composing the shot with higher-contrast subject areas centered before you press the shutter button halfway. Otherwise, try pressing the shutter button halfway repeatedly.

Subjects in shots look too dark.

- Set the flash mode to [\$] (156).
- Adjust brightness by using exposure compensation (<u>48</u>).
- Adjust contrast by using i-Contrast (150, 71).
- Use AE lock or spot metering (149).

Subjects look too bright, highlights are washed-out.

- Set the flash mode to [3] (133).
- Adjust brightness by using exposure compensation (248).
- Use AE lock or spot metering (149).
- Reduce the lighting on subjects.

Shots look too dark despite the flash firing (28).

- Shoot within flash range (114).
- Increase the ISO speed (150).

Subjects in flash shots look too bright, highlights are washed-out.

- Shoot within flash range (114).
- Set the flash mode to [()] ([]33).

White dots or similar image artifacts appear in flash shots.

This is caused by light from the flash reflecting off dust or airborne particles.

Shots look grainy.

- Lower the ISO speed (¹, 50).
- High ISO speeds in some shooting modes may cause grainy images (^[]50).

Subjects are affected by red-eye (236).

- Set [Lamp Setting] to [On] (¹,38) to activate the red-eye reduction lamp (¹,4) in flash shots. Note that while the red-eye reduction lamp is on (for about one second), it is not possible to shoot, because the lamp is counteracting red-eye. For best results, have subjects look at the red-eye reduction lamp. Also try increasing the lighting in indoor scenes and shooting at closer range.
- Edit images using red-eye correction (271).

Recording to the memory card takes too long, or continuous shooting is slower.

• Use the camera to perform low-level formatting of the memory card (Q77).

Shooting settings or FUNC. menu settings are not available.

 Available setting items vary by shooting mode. Refer to "Functions Available in Each Shooting Mode", "FUNC. Menu", and "Shooting Tab Menu" (<u>105 – 109</u>).

Shooting Movies

The elapsed time shown is incorrect, or recording is interrupted.

Use the camera to format the memory card, or switch to a card that supports high-speed recording. Note that even if the elapsed time display is incorrect, the length of movies on the memory card corresponds to the actual recording time (¹⁷⁶, 114).

[1] is displayed and shooting stops automatically.

The camera's internal memory buffer filled up as the camera could not record to the memory card quickly enough. Try one of the following measures.

- Use the camera to perform low-level formatting of the memory card (277).
- Lower the image quality (237).
- Switch to a memory card that supports high-speed recording ([114).

Playback

Playback is not possible.

 Image or movie playback may not be possible if a computer is used to rename files or alter the folder structure. Refer to "Software Instruction Manual" (286) for details on folder structure and file names.



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Playback stops, or audio skips.

- Switch to a memory card that you have performed low-level formatting on with the camera (<u>177</u>).
- There may be brief interruptions when playing movies copied to memory cards that have slow read speeds.
- When movies are played on a computer, frames may be dropped and audio may skip if computer performance is inadequate.

Sound is not played during movies.

 Adjust the volume (<u>62</u>) if you have activated [Mute] (<u>74</u>) or the sound in the movie is faint.

Memory Card

The memory card is not recognized.

• Restart the camera, with the memory card in it (220).

Computer

Cannot transfer images to a computer.

When attempting to transfer images to the computer via a cable, try reducing the transfer speed as follows.

Press the < >> button to enter Playback mode. Hold the < MENU> button down as you press the < A> and < >> buttons at the same time. On the next screen, press the < <>> buttons to choose [B], and then press the < >> button.

Naming error!

 The folder could not be created or images could not be recorded, because the highest supported folder number (999) for storing images on the card has been reached and the highest supported image number (9999) for images in folders has been reached. On the [11] tab, change [File Numbering] to [Auto Reset] (277), or format the memory card (276).

Lens Error

- This error may occur if the lens is held while it is moving, or when the camera is used in dusty or sandy locations.
- Frequent display of this error message may indicate camera damage. In this case, contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk.

A camera error was detected (error number)

- If this error message is displayed immediately after a shot, the image may not have been saved. Switch to Playback mode to check for the image.
- Frequent display of this error message may indicate camera damage. In this case, write down the error number (*Exx*) and contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk.

File Error

 Correct printing (289) may not be possible for photos from other cameras or images that have been altered using computer software, even if the camera is connected to the printer.

Print error

 Check the paper size setting (<u>1991</u>). If this error message is displayed when the setting is correct, restart the printer and complete the setting on the camera again.

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
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

Handling Precautions

- The camera is a high-precision electronic device. Avoid dropping it or subjecting it to strong impact.
- Never bring the camera near magnets, motors, or other devices that generate strong electromagnetic fields, which may cause malfunction or erase image data.
- If water droplets or dirt adheres to the camera or screen, wipe with a dry soft cloth, such as an eyeglass cloth. Do not rub hard or apply force.
- Never use cleaners containing organic solvents to clean the camera or screen.
- Use a blower brush to remove dust from the lens. If cleaning is difficult, contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk.
- To prevent condensation from forming on the camera after sudden temperature changes (when the camera is transferred from cold to warm environments), put the camera in an airtight, resealable plastic bag and let it gradually adjust to the temperature before removing it from the bag.
- If condensation does form on the camera, stop using it immediately. Continuing to use the camera in this state may damage it. Remove the battery pack and memory card, and wait until the moisture has evaporated before resuming use.
- Before long-term battery storage, use up the battery pack's remaining charge, remove it from the camera, and store it in a plastic bag or similar container. Storing a partially charged battery pack over extended periods (about a year) may shorten its life or affect performance.
