Installation




Antennas

Request regular internal testing and cleaning for your camera. Build-up of dust in your camera can cause a fire or electric shock. Contact your FUJIFILM dealer to request internal cleaning every two years. Please note that this service is not free of charge.

The Battery and Power Supply

Note: Check the type of battery used in your camera and read the appropriate sections.

The following describes the proper use of batteries and how to prolong their life. Incorrect use can shorten battery life or cause leakage, overheating, fire, or explosion.

Li-ion Batteries

Read this section if your camera uses a rechargeable Li-ion battery.

The battery is not charged at shipment. Charge the battery before use. Keep the battery in its case when not in use.

■ Notes on the Battery

The battery gradually loses its charge when not in use. Charge the battery one or two days before use.

Battery life can be extended by turning the camera off when not in use.

Battery capacity decreases at low temperatures; a depleted battery may not function at when cold. Keep a fully charged spare battery in a warm place and exchange as necessary. or keep the battery in your pocket or other warm place and insert it in the camera only when shooting. Do not place the battery in direct contact with hand warmers or other heating devices.

■ Charging the Battery

Charge the battery in the supplied battery charger. Charging times will increase at ambient temperatures below +10°C (+50°F) or above +35°C (+95°F). Do not attempt to charge the battery at temperatures above 40 °C (+104 °F); at temperatures below 0°C (+32°F), the battery will not

Do not attempt to recharge a fully charged battery. The battery does not however need to be fully discharged before charging.

The battery may be warm to the touch immediately after charging or use. This is normal.

■ Battery Life

At normal temperatures, the battery can be recharged about 300 times. A noticeable decrease in the length of time the battery will hold a charge indicates that it has reached the end of its service life and should be replaced.

■ Storage

Performance may be impaired if the battery is left unused for extended periods when fully charged. Run the battery flat before storing it.

If the camera will not be used for an extended period, remove the battery and store it in a dry place with an ambient temperature of from $+15^{\circ}\text{C}$ to $+25^{\circ}\text{C}$ ($+59^{\circ}\text{T}$ to $+77^{\circ}\text{P}$). Do not store in locations exposed to extremes of temperature.

■ Cautions: Handling the Battery

- Do not transport or store with metal objects such as necklaces or hairpins.
- · Do not expose to flame or heat.
- · Do not disassemble or modify.
- · Use with designated chargers only.
- · Dispose of used batteries promptly.
- · Do not drop or subject to strong physical shocks.
- Do not expose to water.
- · Keep the terminals clean.
- The battery and camera body may become warm to the touch after extended use. This is normal.

AA Alkaline/Rechargeable Ni-MH Batteries

Read this section if your camera uses AA alkaline or rechargeable AA Ni-MH batteries. Information on compatible battery types may be found elsewhere in the camera manual.

■ Cautions: Handling the Batteries

- Do not expose to water, flame, or heat, or store in warm or humid conditions.
- Do not transport or store with metal objects such as necklaces or hairpins.
- Do not disassemble or modify the batteries or battery casing.
- · Do not subject to strong physical shocks.

- Do not use batteries that are leaking, deformed, or discolored
- · Keep out of reach of infants and small children.
- · Insert in the correct orientation.
- Do not mix old and new batteries, batteries with different charge levels, or batteries of different types.
- If the camera will not be used for an extended period, remove the batteries. Note that the camera clock will be reset.
 The batteries may be warm to the touch immediately after
- The batteries may be warm to the touch immediately after use. Turn the camera off and allow the batteries to cool before handling.
- Battery capacity tends to decrease at low temperatures.
 Keep spare batteries in a pocket or other warm place and exchange as necessary. Cold batteries may recover some of their charge when warmed.
- Fingerprints and other stains on the battery terminals can impair battery performance. Thoroughly clean the terminals with a soft, dry cloth before inserting them in the camera.



If the batteries leak, clean the battery compartment thoroughly before inserting new batteries.



If fluid from the battery comes into contact with skin or clothing, flush the affected area with water.

fluid enters your eyes, immediately flush the affected area with water and seek medical attention. Do not rub your eyes. Failure to observe this precaution could result in permanent visual impairment.

■ Ni-MH Batteries

The capacity of Ni-MH batteries may be temporarily reduced when new, after long periods of disuse, or if they are repeatedly recharged before being fully discharged. This is normal and does not indicate a malfunction. Capacity can be increased by repeatedly discharging the batteries using the discharge option in the camera setup menu and recharging them using a battery charger.

 CAUTION: Do not use the discharge option with alkaline batteries.

The camera draws a small amount of current even when off. Ni-MH batteries that have been left in the camera for an extended period may be drawn down to the point that they no longer hold a charge. Battery performance may also drop if the batteries are run down in a device such as a flashlight. Use the discharge option in the camera setup menu to discharge Ni-MH batteries. Batteries that no longer hold a charge even after repeatedly being discharged and recharged have reached the end of their service life and must be replaced.

Ni-MH batteries can be recharged in a battery charger (sold separately). Batteries may become warm to the touch after charging. Refer to the instructions provided with the charger for more information. Use the charger with compatible batteries only.

Ni-MH batteries gradually lose their charge when not in use.

■ Disposal

Dispose of used batteries in accord with local regulations.

AC Power Adapters (Available Separately)

This section applies to all camera models. Use only FUJIFILM AC power adapters designated for use with this camera. Other adapters could damage the camera.

- The AC power adapter is for indoor use only.
- ${\boldsymbol{\cdot}}$ Be sure the DC plug is securely connected to the camera.
- Turn the camera off before disconnecting the adapter.
 Disconnect the adapter by the plug, not the cable.
- Do not use with other devices.
- · Do not disassemble.
- · Do not expose to high heat and humidity.
- Do not subject to strong physical shocks.
- The adapter may hum or become hot to the touch during use. This is normal.
- If the adapter causes radio interference, reorient or relocate the receiving antenna.

Using the Camera

- Do not aim the camera at extremely bright light sources, such as the sun in a cloudless sky. Failure to observe this precaution could damage the camera image sensor.
- Strong sunlight focused through the viewfinder may damage the panel of electronic viewfinder (EVF). Do not aim the electronic viewfinder at the sun.

Take Test Shots

Before taking photographs on important occasions (such as at weddings or before taking the camera on a trip), take a test shot and view the results to ensure that the camera is functioning normally. FUJIFILM Corporation can not accept liability for damages or lost profits incurred as a result of product malfunction.

Notes on Copyright

Unless intended solely for personal use, images recorded using your digital camera system cannot be used in ways that infringe copyright laws without the consent of the owner. Note that some restrictions apply to the photographing of stage performances, entertainments, and exhibits, even when intended purely for personal use. Handling

To ensure that images are recorded correctly, do not subject the camera to impact or physical shocks while images are being recorded.

Memory Cards

Pictures are stored on optional SD, SDHC, and SDXC memory cards (🗎 14), referred to in this manual as "memory cards."

Product Care

Camera body: For continued enjoyment of your camera, use a soft, dry cloth to clean the camera body after each use. Do not use alcohol, thinner, or other volatile chemicals, which could discolor or deform the leather on the camera body. Any liquid on the camera should be removed immediately with a soft, dry cloth. Use a blower to remove dust from the monitor, taking care to avoid scratches, and then gently wipe with a soft, dry cloth. Any remaining stains can be removed by wiping gently with a piece of FUJIFILM lens-cleaning paper to which a small amount of lens-cleaning fluid has been applied. To prevent dust entering the camera, replace the body cap when no lens is in place.

Image sensor: Dust can be removed from the image sensor using the **SENSOR CLEANING** option in the setup menu (**SENSOR CLEANING** option in the setup menu

Interchangeable lenses: Use a blower to remove dust, then gently wipe with a soft, dry cloth. Any remaining stains can be removed by wiping gently with a piece of FUJIFILM lens-cleaning paper to which a small amount of lens-cleaning fluid has been applied. Replace the front and rear caps when the lens is not use.





The Indicator Lamp

The indicator lamp shows camera status as follows:




Silent Mode

The camera speaker, flash, and AF-assist illuminator/self-timer lamp turn off and flash and volume settings can not be adjusted (note that silent mode can not be enabled or disabled while movie playback is in progress). Press the **DISP/BACK** button again to resume normal operation.

The Selector

Press the selector up (1), right (2), down (3), or left (4) to 5highlight items and press MENU/ **OK** (5) to select. Pressing the selector up (MACRO) during shooting displays macro options (29).



Control Lock

To avoid accidentally displaying macro options during shooting, press MENU/OK until en is displayed. The control can be unlocked by pressing MENU/OK until 🤮 is no longer displayed.

The Command Dial

The command dial can be used to navigate the menus, to view pictures (23), and to select options in the quick menu display (\$\square\$ 32).









First Steps

Attaching the Strap

Attach the strap clips to the camera and then attach the strap.

1 Open a strap clip.

Use the clip attaching tool to open a strap clip, making sure that the tool and clip are in the orientations shown.






① Keep the tool in a safe place. You will need it to open the strap clips when removing the strap.

2 Place the strap clip on an eyelet.

Hook the strap eyelet in the clip opening. Remove the tool, using the other hand to keep the clip in place.






3 Pass the clip through the eyelet.

Rotate the clip fully through the eyelet until it clicks closed.



4 Attach a protective cover.

Place a protective cover over the eyelet as shown, with the black side of the cover toward the camera. Repeat Steps 1–4 for the second eyelet.



5 Insert the strap.

Insert the strap through a protective cover and strap clip.



6 Fasten the strap.

Fasten the strap as shown. Repeat Steps 5–6 for the second eyelet.



 $\ensuremath{\mathfrak{D}}$ To avoid dropping the camera, be sure the strap is correctly secured.

Attaching a Lens

Lenses attach as described below.

① Care is required to prevent dust entering the camera while attaching and removing lenses.

1 Remove the body and rear caps.

Remove the body cap from the camera and the rear cap from the lens.



① Do not touch the camera's internal parts.

2 Attach the lens.

Place the lens on mount, keeping the marks on the lens and camera aligned, and then rotate the lens until it clicks into place.



① Do not press the lens release button while attaching the lens.

Removing Lenses

To remove the lens, turn the camera off, then press the lens release button and rotate the lens as shown.

① To prevent dust accumulating on the lens or inside the camera, replace the lens caps and camera body cap when the lens is not attached



Charging the Battery

The battery is not charged at shipment. Charge the battery before use.

1 Place the battery in the charger.

Place the battery in the supplied battery charger as shown.



The camera uses an NP-W126 rechargeable battery.

2 Plug the charger in.

Plug the charger into a power outlet. The charging indicator will light.

The Charging Indicator

The charging indicator shows battery charge status as follows:



Inserting the Battery and a Memory Card

The camera has no internal memory; instead, pictures are stored on optional SD, SDHC, and SDXC memory cards (sold separately). After charging the battery, insert the battery and memory card as described below.

1 Open the battery-chamber cover.


Slide the battery-chamber latch as shown and open the battery-chamber cover.



- ① Do not open the battery-chamber cover when the camera is on. Failure to observe this precaution could damage image files or memory cards.
- ① Do not use excessive force when handling the battery-chamber cover.

2 Insert the battery.

Using the battery to keep the battery latch pressed to one side, insert the battery contacts first in the direction shown by the arrow. Confirm that the battery is securely latched.




Battery latch

① Insert the battery in the correct orientation. *Do not use force or attempt to insert the battery upside down or backwards*. The battery will slide in easily in the correct orientation.

3 Insert the memory card. Holding the memory card in the orientation shown at right, slide it in until it clicks into place at the back of the slot. Click

- Be sure card is in the correct orientation; do not insert at an angle or use force.
- ① SD/SDHC/SDXC memory cards can be locked, making it impossible to format the card or to record or delete images.



Write-protect switch

4 Close the battery-chamber cover.

Slide the battery-chamber latch as shown and close the battery-chamber cover.





Removing the Battery and Memory Card

Before removing the battery or memory card, turn the camera off and open the battery-chamber cover.

To remove the battery, press the battery latch to the side, and slide the battery out of the camera as shown.



Battery latch

To remove the memory card, press it in and release it slowly. The card can then be removed by hand. When a memory card



is removed, the card could be ejected too guickly. Use your finger to hold it and gently release the card.

① Ratteries

- Remove dirt from the battery terminals with a clean, dry cloth. Failure to observe this precaution could prevent the battery from charging.
- Do not affix stickers or other objects to the battery. Failure to observe this precaution could make it impossible to remove the battery from the camera.
- Do not short the battery terminals. The battery could overheat.
- Read the cautions in "The Battery and Power Supply (iv).
- Use only battery chargers designated for use with the battery. Failure to observe this precaution could result in product malfunction.
- Do not remove the labels from the battery or attempt to split or peel the outer casing.
- The battery gradually loses its charge when not in use. Charge the battery one or two days before use.

① Memory Cards

- Do not turn the camera off or remove the memory card while the memory card is being formatted or data are being recorded to or deleted from the card. Failure to observe this precaution could damage the card.
- Format memory cards before first use, and be sure to reformat all memory cards after using them in a computer or other device. For more information on formatting memory cards, see page 86.
- Memory cards are small and can be swallowed; keep out of reach of children. If a child swallows a memory card, seek medical assistance immediately.
- miniSD or microSD adapters that are larger or smaller than the standard dimensions of an SD/SDHC/SDXC card
 may not eject normally; if the card does not eject, take the camera to an authorized service representative. Do
 not forcibly remove the card.
- Do not affix labels to memory cards. Peeling labels can cause camera malfunction.

Turning the Camera on and Off

Rotate the **ON/OFF** switch to **ON** to turn the camera on. Select **OFF** to turn the camera off.

- ① Fingerprints and other marks on the lens or viewfinder can affect pictures or the view through the viewfinder. Keep the lens and viewfinder clean.

Basic Setup

A language-selection dialog is displayed the first time the camera is turned on. Set up the camera as described below (you can reset the clock or change languages at any time using the **DATE/TIME** or **图 言語/LANG.** options in the setup menu; for information on displaying the setup menu, see page 83).

1 Choose a language.



Highlight a language and press MENU/OK.



Press DISP/BACK to skip the current step. Any steps you skip will be displayed the next time the camera is turned on.

2 Set the date and time.



Press the selector left or right to highlight the year, month, day, hour, or minute and press up or down to change. To change the order in which the year, month, and day are displayed, highlight the date format and press the selector up or down. 

Choosing a Display

The camera is equipped with an electronic viewfinder (EVF) and an LCD monitor (LCD). Press **VIEW MODE** to choose a display.




Automatic Display Selection

The viewfinder turns on automatically when you put your eye to the viewfinder, and the LCD monitor turns on when you take your eye away (note that the eye sensor may respond to objects other than your eye or to light shining directly on the sensor).



Focusing the Viewfinder

The camera is equipped with diopter adjustment in the range -4 to $+2\,\mathrm{m}^{-1}$ to accommodate individual differences in vision. Rotate the diopter adjustment control until the viewfinder display is in sharp focus.



Histograms show the distribution of tones in the image. Brightness is shown by the horizontal axis, the number of pixels by the vertical axis.



Optimal exposure: Pixels are distributed in an even curve throughout the tone range.



Underexposed: Pixels are clustered on the left side of the graph.









Taking Photographs

This section describes how to take pictures using program AE (mode **P**). For information on **S**, **A**, and **M** modes, see page 33.

1 Select program AE.

Set shutter speed and aperture to **A** (shutter speed is set by rotating the shutter speed dial; for information on adjusting aperture, see the lens manual). **P** will appear in the display.




The O Button

The **Q** button can be used to view and adjust camera settings (**E** 32).


2 Select single AF.

Rotate the focus mode selector to **S** (22).



3 Ready the camera.

Hold the camera steady with both hands and brace your elbows against your sides. Shaking or unsteady hands can blur your shots.








4 Focus.

Frame the picture with your subject in the center of the display and press the shutter button halfway to focus.

▶ If the subject is poorly lit, the AF-assist illuminator may light (■ 73).



If the camera is unable to focus, the focus frame will turn red, and **!AF** will be displayed. If the subject is close to the camera (about 80 cm/2.6 ft. or less from the lens in the case of XF 18 mm, 35 mm, and 60 mm lenses; the actual distance varies with the lens), select macro mode and try again (1) 29).

5 Shoot.

Smoothly press the shutter button the rest of the way down to take the picture.



Viewing Pictures

Viewing Pictures Full Frame

Pictures can be viewed in the viewfinder or LCD monitor. When taking important pictures, take a test shot and check the results.

To view pictures full frame, press **.**



Additional pictures can be viewed by pressing the selector left or right or rotating the command dial. Press the selector or rotate the dial right to view pictures in the order recorded, left to view pictures in reverse order. Keep the selector pressed to scroll rapidly to the desired frame.



Multi-Frame Playback

To change the number of images displayed, press \mathbf{Q} when a picture is displayed full frame.

Deleting Pictures

Follow the steps below to delete the current picture. *Note that deleted pictures can not be recovered;* copy important pictures to a computer or other storage device before proceeding.



Use the built-in flash for additional lighting when shooting at night or indoors under low light.

^{*} Red-eye removal (இ, 🍑, இ, or இ) is available in these modes when ON is selected for RED EYE REMOVAL in the shooting menu (🗎 74). Red-eye removal minimizes "redeye" caused when light from the flash is reflected from the subject's retinas as shown in the illustration at right.





- ① Depending on the distance to the subject, some lenses may cast shadows in photos taken with the flash.
- Lower the flash where flash photography is prohibited or to capture natural lighting under dim light. We also recommend that you lower the flash when the camera is off.
- If 3 is displayed when the shutter button is pressed halfway, the flash will fire when the photo is taken.
- Except in commander mode, the flash may fire several times with each shot. Do not move the camera until shooting is complete.

Flash Sync Speed

The flash will synchronize with the shutter at shutter speeds of 1/180 s or slower.

• Optional Flash Units

The camera can also be used with optional FUJIFILM shoe-mounted flash units. Do not use third-party flash units that apply over 300 V to the camera hot shoe.

Macro Mode (Close-ups)

To focus at short distances, press the selector up (MACRO) and select . To exit macro mode, press the selector up and select OFF.





Basic Movie Recording and Playback

Recording High-Definition (HD) Movies

The camera can be used to record short high-definition movies. Sound is recorded in stereo via the built-in microphone; do not cover the microphone during recording.

- **1** Set aperture to **A** (for more information, see the lens manual).

- 2 Press the **DRIVE** button to display drive options. Press the selector up or down to highlight **(MOVIE)** and press **MENU/OK**.



3 Press the shutter button all the way down to start recording.



4 Press the shutter button all the way down again to end recording. Recording ends automatically when the memory card is full.



- ▶ Focus, exposure, and white balance are adjusted automatically throughout recording. The color and brightness of the image may vary from those displayed before recording begins.
- The indicator lamp lights while movies are being recorded.
- ① The microphone may pick up lens noise and other sounds made by the camera during recording.
- ① Vertical or horizontal streaks may appear in movies containing very bright subjects. This is normal and does not indicate a malfunction.

The Q Button

The \mathbf{Q} button can be used to view and adjust camera settings (\mathbf{H} 32).






To allow the camera to adjust both shutter speed and aperture for optimal exposure, set shutter speed and aperture to **A** (shutter speed is set by rotating the shutter speed dial; for information on adjusting aperture, see the lens manual). **P** will appear in the display.

① If the subject is outside the metering range of the camera, the shutter speed and aperture displays will show "---".



Program Shift


If desired, you can press the selector left or right to other combinations of shutter speed and aperture without altering exposure (program shift). The new values for shutter speed and aperture are shown in yellow. Program shift is not available if the attached flash supports TTL auto, **AUTO** is selected for **DYNAMIC RANGE** in the shooting menu (**101** 70), or an auto option is selected for **103 ISO** in the shooting menu (**101** 41). To cancel program shift, turn the camera off.



Shutter-Priority AE (S)

To adjust shutter speed manually while letting the camera select aperture for optimal exposure, set aperture to $\bf A$ as described in the lens manual and use the shutter speed dial. $\bf S$ will appear in the display.


- ◆ Shutter speed can also be adjusted in increments of ⅓ EV by pressing the selector left or right.
- ① If the correct exposure can not be achieved at the selected shutter speed, aperture will be displayed in red when the shutter button is pressed halfway. Adjust shutter speed until the correct exposure is achieved.
- 1 If the subject is outside the metering range of the camera, the aperture display will show "---".



Aperture-Priority AE (A)

To adjust aperture manually while letting the camera select shutter speed for optimal exposure, rotate the shutter speed dial to **A** and adjust aperture as described in the lens manual. **A** will appear in the display.


- ① If the correct exposure can not be achieved at the selected aperture, the shutter speed will be displayed in red when the shutter button is pressed halfway. Adjust aperture until the correct exposure is achieved
- 1 If the subject is outside the metering range of the camera, the shutter speed display will show "---".





Previewing Depth of Field


When S PREVIEW DEPTH OF FIELD is selected for In Fin BUTTON (III) 66) in the shooting menu, pressing the Fin button stops aperture down to the selected setting, allowing depth of field to be previewed in the viewfinder or LCD monitor.



Manual Exposure (M)

Exposure can be altered from the value suggested by the camera by setting both shutter speed and aperture to values other than **A** (shutter speed is set by rotating the shutter speed dial; for information on adjusting aperture, see the lens manual). **M** will appear in the display.

- Shutter speed can also be adjusted in increments of ½ EV by pressing the selector left or right.
- The manual exposure display includes an exposure indicator that shows the amount the picture would be under- or over-exposed at current settings.



Long Time-Exposures (T/B)

Select a shutter speed of **T** (time) or **B** (bulb) for long time-exposures.

- Use of a tripod is recommended to prevent the camera from moving during the exposure.
- To reduce "noise" (mottling) in long time-exposures, select ON for LONG EXPOSURE NR in the shooting menu (■ 71). Note that this may increase the time needed to record images after shooting.

Time (T)

1 Rotate the shutter speed dial to **T**.



2 Press the selector left or right to choose a shutter speed between 30 s and ½ s in steps of ½ EV.



3 Press the shutter button all the way down to take a picture at the selected shutter speed. A count-down timer will be displayed while the exposure is in progress.



Bulb (B)

1 Rotate the shutter speed dial to B.




2 Press the shutter button all the way down. The shutter will remain open for up to 60 minutes while the shutter button is pressed; the display shows the time elapsed since the exposure started.



Selecting an aperture of A fixes shutter speed at 30 s.


Using a Remote Release

An optional RR-80 remote release can be used for long time-exposures. See the manual provided with the RR-80 for more information.



Third-Party Remote Releases

Third-party remote releases (available from third-party suppliers) can be connected as shown below.



Alternatively, electronic remote releases can be connected via the microphone/remote release connector.



White Balance

For natural colors, select **WHITE BALANCE** in the shooting menu to display the following options, then use the selector to highlight an option that matches the light source and press **MENU/OK**. The dialog shown at bottom right will be displayed; use the selector to fine-tune white balance or press **DISP/BACK** to exit without fine-tuning (for an explanation of "white balance," see the Glossary on page 112).

- ♦ White balance is adjusted for flash lighting only in **AUTO** and modes. Turn the flash off using other white balance options.
- Results vary with shooting conditions. Play pictures back after shooting to check colors.
- ▶ White balance can also be adjusted using the **Q** button.

Custom White Balance

Choose \square to adjust white balance for unusual lighting conditions. White balance measurement options will be displayed; frame a white object so that it fills the display and press the shutter button all the way down to measure white balance (to select the most recent custom value and exit without measuring white balance, press **DISP/BACK**, or press **MENU/OK** to select the most recent value and display the fine-tuning dialog).

- If "COMPLETED!" is displayed, press MENU/OK to set white balance to the measured value.
- If "UNDER" is displayed, raise exposure compensation (🗐 47) and try again.
- If "OVER" is displayed, lower exposure compensation (47) and try again.

Color Temperature

Color temperature is an objective measure of the color of a light source, expressed in Kelvin (K). Light sources with a color temperature close to that of direct sunlight appear white; light sources with a lower color temperature have a yellow or red cast, while those with a higher color temperature are tinged with blue. You can match color temperature to the light source as shown in the following table, or choose options that differ sharply from the color of the light source to make pictures "warmer" or "colder."

Sensitivity

"Sensitivity" refers to the camera's sensitivity to light. Choose from values between 200 and 6400, or select L (100), H (12800), or H (25600) for special situations. Higher values can be used to reduce a blur when lighting is poor, while lower values allow slower shutter speeds or wider apertures in bright light; note, however, that mottling may appear in pictures taken at high sensitivities, particularly at H (25600), while choosing L (100) reduces dynamic range. Values of from ISO 200 to ISO 6400 are recommended in most situations. If an AUTO option is selected, the camera will adjust sensitivity automatically in response to shooting conditions; the value in parentheses is the maximum sensitivity that will be selected when the subject is poorly lit.

- 1 Press MENU/OK in shooting mode to display the shooting menu. Press the selector up or down to highlight 150 and press MENU/OK.
 - At default settings, ISO options can also be displayed by pressing the Fn button.
- 2 Press the selector up or down to highlight the desired option and press MENU/OK to select.








- Sensitivity is not reset when the camera is turned off.
- ▶ L (100) is reset to ISO 200 and H (12800) and H (25600) are reset to ISO 6400 when RAW, FINE+RAW, or **NORMAL+RAW** is selected for image quality (EEG9). For more information on the settings available with **L (100)**, **H (12800)**, and **H (25600)**, see page 119.

Focus Mode

Use the focus mode selector to choose how the camera focuses (note that regardless of the option selected, manual focus will be used when the lens is in manual focus mode).



- **S** (single AF): Focus locks while the shutter button is pressed halfway. Choose for stationary subjects.
- C (continuous AF): Focus is continually adjusted to reflect changes in the distance to the subject even when the shutter button is not pressed halfway (note that this increases the drain on the battery).
- M (manual): Focus manually using the lens focus ring. Rotate the ring left to reduce the focus distance, right to increase. The manual focus indicator indicates how closely the focus distance matches the distance to the subject in the focus brackets (the red bar indicates the focus distance, the white bar the depth of field, or in other words the distance in front of and behind the focus point that appears to be in focus); you can also check focus visually in the viewfinder or LCD monitor. Choose for manual control of focus or in situations in which the camera is unable to focus using autofocus (🗎 46).



- lacktriangle Use the lacktriangle FOCUS RING option in the setup menu (lacktriangle 84) to reverse the direction of rotation of the focus ring.
- The camera will not focus if the focus ring is rotated past infinity.
- To focus using autofocus, press the AE-L/AF-L button. This can be used to quickly focus on a chosen subject in manual focus mode.
- The camera can show focus distance in meters or feet. Use the FOCUS SCALE UNITS option in the setup menu (☐ 86) to choose the units used.


Manual Focus: Checking Focus


Pressing the center of the command dial magnifies the view in the viewfinder or LCD monitor for precise focus; rotate the dial to zoom in or out. To scroll to other areas of the frame, press the **AF** button and use the selector.



Focus Frame Selection

When AREA is selected for AF MODE in the shooting menu and S is selected for focus mode, the camera offers a choice of focus points, allowing photographs to be composed with the main subject positioned almost anywhere in the frame. To position the focus frame, press the AF button and use the selector (the focus frame can be returned to the center by pressing MENU/OK). Press the AF button again to put the setting into effect.













Focus/Exposure Lock

To compose photographs with off-center subjects:

1 Focus: Position the subject in the focus frame and press the shutter button halfway to lock focus and exposure. Focus and exposure will remain locked while the shutter button is pressed halfway (AF/AE lock).



- Depending on the option selected for AE/AF-LOCK BUTTON in the shooting menu (■ 73), focus and/or exposure can also be locked by pressing the AE-L/AF-L button; focus and/or exposure will remain locked even when the shutter button is pressed halfway. Choose AE LOCK ONLY to lock exposure but not focus, AF LOCK ONLY to lock focus but not exposure, or AE/AF LOCK to lock both focus and exposure. Regardless of the option selected, the AE-L/AF-L button can not be used to lock exposure in manual focus mode (■ 42).
- **2 Recompose**: Keep the shutter button pressed halfway or keep the **AE-L/AF-L** button pressed.
 - If AE&AF ON/OFF SWITCH is selected for AE/AF-LOCK MODE (■ 73), focus and/or exposure lock when the AE-L/AF-L button is pressed and remain locked until the button is pressed again.









Although the camera boasts a high-precision autofocus system, it may be unable to focus on the subjects listed below.

• Very shiny subjects such as mirrors or car bodies.

• Fast-moving subjects.






- Subjects photographed through a window or other reflective object.
- Dark subjects and subjects that absorb rather than reflect light, such as hair or fur.
- Insubstantial subjects, such as smoke or flame.
- Subjects that show little contrast with the background (for example, subjects in clothing that is the same color as the background).
- Subjects positioned in front of or behind a high-contrast object that is also in the focus frame (for example, a subject photographed against a backdrop of highly contrasting elements).

Exposure Compensation


Rotate the exposure compensation dial to adjust exposure when photographing very bright, very dark, or high-contrast subjects. The effect is visible in the display.





Choose positive values (+) to increase exposure









Exposure Value (EV)

The exposure value is determined by the sensitivity of the image sensor and the amount of light to which the sensor is exposed. Doubling the amount increases EV by one, while halving it reduces EV by one. The amount of light entering the camera can be controlled by adjusting aperture and shutter speed.

Choosing an Exposure Compensation Value

• Backlit subjects: Choose values from +2/3 EV to +12/3 EV.



 Highly reflective subjects or very bright scenes (e.g., snowfields): +1 EV



- Scenes that are mostly sky: +1 EV
- **Spotlit subjects** (particularly if photographed against dark backgrounds): −2/3 EV
- Subjects with low reflectivity (pine trees or dark-colored foliage):
 -2/3 EV

Metering

To choose how the camera meters exposure, press the **AE** button to display metering options. Use the selector to highlight an option and press **AE** to select.

Mode	Description
(MULTI)	The camera instantly determines exposure based on an analysis of composition, color, and brightness distribution. Recommended in most situations.
(SPOT)	The camera meters lighting conditions in an area at the center of the frame equivalent to 2% of the total. Recommended with backlit subjects and in other cases in which the background is much brighter or darker than the main subject.
(AVERAGE)	Exposure is set to the average for the entire frame. Provides consistent exposure across multiple shots with the same lighting, and is particularly effective for landscapes and portraits of subjects dressed in black or white.









Using the Self-Timer

Use the timer for self-portraits or to prevent blur caused by camera shake.

1 Press MENU/OK in shooting mode to display the shooting menu. Press the selector up or down to highlight SELF-TIMER and press MENU/OK.







2 Press the selector up or down to highlight one of the following options and press **MENU/OK** to select.

€2 2 SEC	The shutter is released two seconds after the shutter button is pressed. Use to reduce blur caused by the camera moving when the shutter button is pressed.

- **3** Press the shutter button halfway to focus.
 - ① Stand behind the camera when using the shutter button. Standing in front of the lens can interfere with focus and exposure.




4 Press the shutter button the rest of the way down to start the timer. The display in the monitor shows the number of seconds remaining until the shutter is released. To stop the timer before the picture is taken, press **DISP/BACK**.



The self-timer lamp on the front of the camera will blink immediately before the picture is taken. If the two-second timer is selected, the self-timer lamp will blink as the timer counts down.

• The self-timer turns off automatically when the camera is turned off.



Film Simulation

Simulate the effects of different kinds of film, including black-and-white (with or without color filters).

1 Press MENU/OK in shooting mode to display the shooting menu. Press the selector up or down to highlight TIFILM SIMULATION and press MENU/OK.





2 Press the selector up or down to highlight one of the following options and press MENU/OK to select.

(PROVIA/STANDARD)	Standard color reproduction. Suited to a wide range of subjects, from portraits to landscapes.

Bracketing

Automatically vary settings over a series of pictures.

1 Press the **DRIVE** button to display drive options and press the selector up or down to highlight one of the following:

AE BKT	Press the selector left or right to highlight a bracketing amount. Each time the shutter button is pressed, the camera will take three shots at up to about 6fps: one using the metered value for exposure, the second overexposed by the selected amount, and the third underexposed by the same amount (regardless of the amount selected, exposure will not exceed the limits of the exposure metering system).	
ISO BKT	Press the selector left or right to highlight a bracketing amount. Each time the shutter is released, the camera will take a picture at the current sensitivity (41) and process it to create two additional copies, one with sensitivity raised and the other with sensitivity lowered by the selected amount (regardless of the amount selected, sensitivity will not exceed ISO 6400 or fall below ISO 200).

Press **MENU/OK** to select the highlighted option.

2 Take photographs.

Multiple Exposures

Create a photograph that combines two exposures.

- 1 Select **ON** for **MULTIPLE EXPOSURE** in the shooting menu.
- 2 Take the first shot.



3 Press **MENU/OK**. You will be prompted to take the second shot.



To return to Step 2 and retake the first shot, press the selector left. To save the first shot and exit without creating a multiple exposure, press DISP/ BACK. **4** Take the second shot.



5 Press **MENU/OK** to create the multiple exposure, or press the selector left to return to Step 4 and retake the second shot.



Continuous Shooting (Burst Mode)

Capture motion in a series of pictures.

1 Press the **DRIVE** button to display drive options.





- 2 Press the selector up or down to choose from frame rates of approximately 6 fps (frames per second) and 3 fps, and press left or right to choose the number of shots per burst. Press MENU/OK to proceed when settings are complete.
- **3** Press the shutter button halfway to focus.




4 Press the shutter button the rest of the way down to start shooting. Shooting ends when the shutter button is released, the selected number of pictures has been taken, or the memory card is full.



- Focus and exposure are determined by the first frame in each series. The flash turns off automatically; the previously-selected flash mode is restored when burst shooting is turned off.
- Frame rate varies with shutter speed and may slow as more shots are taken.
- Additional time may be required to record pictures when shooting ends.
- ▶ If file numbering reaches 999 before shooting is complete, the remaining pictures will be recorded to a new folder (■ 84).
- In some drive modes, shooting may not begin if the space available on the memory card is insufficient.

Viewing Pictures Taken in a Single Burst

When a picture taken in continuous shooting mode is displayed full-frame, the first picture in the current burst can be viewed by pressing the selector down (burst mode playback). Press the selector right to view pictures in the order recorded, left to view pictures in reverse order. Keep the selector pressed to scroll rapidly to the desired frame. To exit, press **DISP/BACK**.







First picture in burst

- Pressing the selector right when the last picture in the burst is displayed displays the first picture in the burst; similarly, pressing the selector left when the first picture is displayed displays the last picture.
- ▶ Deletion (☐ 76), rotation (☐ 78), and protect (☐ 78) operations applied during burst mode playback apply only to the current picture. In contrast, if these operations are performed when a picture taken in continuous shooting mode is displayed in full-frame playback, all images in the same burst will be affected.

Bursts That Cross Folders

If a single burst is spread across multiple folders, the pictures in each folder will be treated as separate bursts.

Panoramas

Follow an on-screen guide to create a panorama.

1 Press the **DRIVE** button to display drive options. Press the selector up or down to highlight [MOTION] PANORAMA) and press MENU/OK.





2 To select the size of the angle through which you will pan the camera while shooting, press the selector left. Highlight a size and press MENU/OK.




3 Press the selector right to view a choice of pan directions. Highlight a pan direction and press MENU/OK.



4 Press the shutter button all the way down to start recording. There is no need to keep the shutter button pressed during recording.

5 Pan the camera in the direction shown by the arrow. Shooting ends automatically when the camera is panned to the end of the guides and the panorama is complete.



Shooting ends if the shutter button is pressed all the way down during shooting. No panorama may be recorded if the shutter button is pressed before the panorama is complete.

The size of the completed panorama varies with the angle and pan direction.

- ① Panoramas are created from multiple frames; exposure for the entire panorama is determined by the first frame. The camera may in some cases record an greater or lesser angle than selected or be unable to stitch the frames together perfectly. The last part of the panorama may not be recorded if shooting ends before the panorama is complete.
- ① Shooting may be interrupted if the camera is panned too quickly or too slowly. Panning the camera in a direction other than that shown cancels shooting.
- ① The desired results may not be achieved with moving subjects, subjects close to the camera, unvarying subjects such as the sky or a field of grass, subjects that are in constant motion, such as waves and waterfalls, or subjects that undergo marked changes in brightness. Panoramas may be blurred if the subject is poorly lit.

For Best Results

For best results, use a lens with a focal length of 35 mm or less (50 mm or less in 35 mm format). Prop your elbows against your sides and move the camera slowly in a small circle at a steady speed, keeping the camera parallel or at right angles to the horizon and being careful only to pan in the direction shown by the guides. Use a tripod for best results. If the desired results are not achieved, try panning at a different speed.

Viewing Panoramas

In full-frame playback, panoramas can be played back using the selector. Press the selector down to start playback and press again to pause. While playback is paused, you can scroll the panorama manually be pressing the selector left or right. To exit to full-frame playback, press the selector up.








Recording Pictures in RAW Format

To toggle RAW image quality on or off for a single shot, assign **RAW** to the **Fn** button (🗎 66). If a JPEG option is currently selected for image quality, pressing the **Fn** button temporarily selects the equivalent JPEG+RAW option. If a JPEG+RAW option is currently selected, pressing the **Fn** button temporarily selects the equivalent JPEG option, while if **RAW** is selected, pressing the **Fn** button temporarily selects **FINE**. Taking a picture or pressing the **Fn** button again restores the previous setting.



- ▶ RAW images record raw, unprocessed data from the camera image sensor. JPEG copies of RAW images can be created using the RAW CONVERSION option in the playback menu, or RAW images can be viewed on a computer using the RAW FILE CONVERTER application that is installed with the software on the supplied CD (■ 88, 89).
- Sensitivities of L (100), H (12800), and H (25600) are not available when RAW image quality is on (≡ 41).

Creating JPEG Copies of RAW Pictures

RAW pictures store information on camera settings separately from the data captured by the camera image sensor. Using the RAW CONVERSION option in the playback menu, you can create JPEG copies of RAW pictures using different options for the settings listed below. The original image data are unaffected, allowing a single RAW image to be processed in a multitude of different ways.

- 1 Press MENU/OK during playback to display the playback menu, then press the selector up or down to highlight RAW CONVERSION and press MENU/OK to display the settings listed in the table at right.
 - ▶ If RAW is assigned to the Fn button (☐ 66), these options can also be displayed by pressing Fn during playback.
- **2** Press the selector up or down to highlight a setting and press the selector right to select. Press the selector up or down to highlight



the desired option and press **MENU/OK** to select and return to the settings list. Repeat this step to adjust additional settings.

3 Press the **Q** button to preview the JPEG copy and press **MENU/OK** to save.

Using a Mount Adapter

When M-mount lenses are attached using an optional FUJIFILM M MOUNT ADAPTER, the camera processes pictures as they are taken to maintain image quality and correct for a variety of effects.

- Attaching a mount adapter enables Sea SHOOT WITHOUT LENS (FIG. 72) and hides the distance indicator in the standard display.
- ▶ Before checking focus, set the focus mode selector to **M** (■ 42).

Mount Adapter Settings

Pressing the function button on the mount adapter displays **MOUNT ADAPTOR SET-**TING options.



Choosing a Focal Length

If the lens has a focal length of 21, 24, 28, or 35 mm, choose a matching option in the **MOUNT ADAPTOR SET-**



TING menu. For other lenses.

select option 5 or 6 to display the menu at right, press the selector right to display focal length settings, and use the selector to enter the focal length.

■ Distortion Correction

Choose from STRONG, MEDI-UM, or WEAK options to correct **BARREL** or **PINCUSHION** distortion.







Pincushion distortion

To determine the amount required, adjust distortion correction while taking photos of graph paper or other objects featuring repeating vertical and horizontal lines, such as the windows in a high-rise.

■ Color Shading Correction

Color (shading) variations between the center and edges of the frame can be adjusted separately for each corner.



To use color shading correction, follow the steps below.

1 Rotate the command dial to choose a corner. The selected corner is indicated by a triangle.



- **2** Use the selector to adjust shading until there is no visible difference in color between the selected corner and the center of the image. Press the selector left or right to adjust colors on the cyan-red axis, up or down to adjust colors on the blueyellow axis. There are a total of 19 positions available on each axis.
- To determine the amount required, adjust color shading correction while taking photos of blue sky or a sheet of gray paper.

■ Peripheral Illumination Correction

Choose from values between -5 and +5. Choosing positive values increases peripheral illumination, while choosing negative values reduces pe-



ripheral illumination. Positive values are recommended for vintage lenses, negative values to create the effect of images taken with an antique lens or a pinhole camera.

To determine the amount required, adjust peripheral illumination correction while taking photos of blue sky or a sheet of gray paper.

Image Search

Follow the steps below to search for pictures.

- 1 Press MENU/OK during playback to display the playback menu. Press the selector up or down to highlight MAGE SEARCH and press MENU/OK.
- 2 Highlight an option and press MENU/OK.

- 1 Select **NEW BOOK** for **PHOTOBOOK AS-SIST** in the playback menu (■ 80) and choose from the following options:
 - **SELECT FROM ALL**: Choose from all available pictures.
 - SELECT BY IMAGE SEARCH: Choose from pictures matching selected search conditions (■ 63).
 - Neither photographs or smaller nor movies can be selected for photobooks.
- **2** Scroll through the images and press the selector up to select or deselect. To display the current image on the cover, press the selector down. Press **MENU/OK** to exit when the book is complete.
 - The first picture selected becomes the cover image. Press the selector down to select a different image for the cover.

- **3** Highlight **COMPLETE PHOTOBOOK** and press **MENU/OK** (to select all photos or all photos matching the specified search conditions for the book, choose **SELECT ALL**). The new book will be added to the list in the photobook assist menu.

Editing and Deleting Photobooks

Display the photobook and press **MENU/OK**. The following options will be displayed; select the desired option and follow the on-screen instructions.

The Fn Button



Advanced Movie Recording

Depth of Field

Aperture can be set manually for movie recording by selecting an aperture other than $\bf A$ for aperture-priority AE. Adjust aperture before recording begins. Choose low f-numbers to soften background details. The effect can be heightened by increasing the distance between your subject and the background.



① Movies recorded when the aperture is displayed in red will not be correctly exposed.

Before Recording

Before recording, adjust movie settings (\square 75), aperture (\square 35), and exposure compensation (\square 47) and select a focus mode (\square 42). These settings can not be adjusted during recording.







 CD in a CD-ROM drive and double-click **Installer for Mac UD A.**3 An installer dialog will be displayed; click **Installing FinePixViewer** to start installation. Enter an administrator name and password when prompted and click **OK**, then follow the on-screen instructions to install FinePixViewer. Click **Exit** to quit the installer when installation is complete.

Viewing RAW Images

RAW FILE CONVERTER software is required to view RAW images on a computer. To install RAW FILE CONVERTER, double-click SILKYRFCEXInstaller. RAW FILE CONVERTER is supported under Mac OS X versions 10.5 to 10.7.

4 Remove the installer CD from the CD-ROM drive. Note that you may be unable to remove the CD if Safari is running; if necessary, guit Safari before removing the CD. Store the installer CD in a dry location out of direct sunlight in case you need to re-install the software.


5 Mac OS X 10.5 or earlier: Open the "Applications" folder, start Image Capture, and select **Preferences...** from the Image Capture application menu. The Image Capture preferences dialog will be displayed; choose **Other...** in the **When a camera is connected, open** menu, then select **FPVBridge** in the "Applications/FinePixViewer" folder and click **Open**. Quit Image Capture.

Mac OS X 10.6: Connect the camera and turn it on. Open the "Applications" folder and start Image Capture. The camera will be listed under **DEVICES**; select the camera and choose **FPVBridge** from the **Connecting this camera opens** menu and click **Choose**. Quit Image Capture.

Installation is now complete. Proceed to "Connecting the Camera" (1991).

Connecting the Camera

- 1 Find a memory card containing pictures you want to copy to the computer and insert the card into the camera (11).
 - Windows users may require the Windows CD when starting the software for the first time.
 - ① Loss of power during transfer could result in loss of data or damage to the memory card. Insert a fresh or fully-charged battery before connecting the camera.
- **2** Turn the camera off and connect the supplied USB cable as shown, making sure the connectors are fully inserted. Connect the camera directly to the computer; do not use a USB hub or keyboard.



3 Turn the camera on. MyFinePix Studio or FinePixViewer will start automatically; follow the on-screen instructions to copy pictures to the computer. To exit without copying pictures, click **Cancel**.

For more information on using the supplied software, start the application and select the appropriate option from the **Help** menu.

- ① If a memory card containing a large number of images is inserted, there may be a delay before the software starts and you may be unable to import or save images. Use a memory card reader to transfer pictures.
- ① Make sure that the computer does not display a message stating that copying is in progress and that the indicator lamp is out before turning the camera off or disconnecting the USB cable (if the number of images copied is very large, the indicator lamp may remain lit after the message has cleared from the computer display). Failure to observe this precaution could result in loss of data or damage to the memory card.
- ① Disconnect the camera before inserting or removing memory cards.
- Φ In some cases, it may not be possible to access pictures saved to a network server using the supplied software in the same way as on a standalone computer.
- ① The user bears all applicable fees charged by the phone company or Internet service provider when using services that require an Internet connection.

Disconnecting the Camera

After confirming that the indicator lamp is out, turn the camera off and disconnect the USB cable.

Uninstalling the Supplied Software

Only uninstall the supplied software when it is no longer required or before beginning reinstallation. After quitting the software and disconnecting the camera, drag the "FinePixViewer" folder from "Applications" into the Trash and select **Empty Trash** in the **Finder** menu (Macintosh), or open the control panel and use "Programs and Features" (Windows 7/Windows Vista) or "Add or Remove Programs" (Windows XP) to uninstall MyFinePix Studio. Under Windows, one or more confirmation dialogs may be displayed; read the contents carefully before clicking **OK**.


Printing Pictures via USB

If the printer supports PictBridge, the camera can be connected directly to the printer and pictures can be printed without first being copied to a computer. Note that depending on the printer, not all the functions described below may be supported.



Connecting the Camera

1 Connect the supplied USB cable as shown and turn the printer on.



2 Turn the camera on. USB will be displayed in the monitor, followed by the PictBridge display shown below at right.



- Pictures can be printed from memory cards that has been formatted in the camera.
- Page size, print quality, and border selections are made using the printer.

Printing Selected Pictures

1 Press the selector left or right to display a picture you wish to print.



- To print one copy of the current picture, proceed directly to Step 3.
- **2** Press the selector up or down to choose the number of copies (up to 99). Repeat steps 1–2 to select additional pictures.



3 Press **MENU/OK** to display a confirmation dialog.







4 Press **MENU/OK** to start printing.



Printing the Date of Recording

To print the date of recording on pictures, press DISP/BACK in the PictBridge display and select PRINT WITH DATE (to print pictures without the date of recording, select PRINT WITHOUT DATE). To ensure that the date is correct, set the camera clock before taking pictures. Some printers do not support date printing. See the printer manual for details.

Printing the DPOF Print Order

To print the print order created with **PRINT ORDER (DPOF)** in the playback menu (**B** 81):

1 In the PictBridge display, press **DISP/ BACK** to open the PictBridge menu.



2 Press the selector up or down to highlight **PRINT DPOF**.





3 Press **MENU/OK** to display a confirmation dialog.





4 Press **MENU/OK** to start printing.



During Printing

The message shown at right is displayed during printing. Press **DISP/BACK** to cancel before all pictures are printed (depending on the printer, printing may end before the current picture has printed).



If printing is interrupted, turn the camera off and then on again.

Disconnecting the Camera

Confirm that the above message is not displayed and turn the camera off. Disconnect the USB cable.

<u>Creating a DPOF Print Order</u>

The PRINT ORDER (DPOF) option in the play-back menu can be used to create a digital "print order" for PictBridge-compatible printers or devices that support DPOF.

DPOF

DPOF (**D**igital **P**rint **O**rder **F**ormat) is standard that allows pictures to be printed from "print orders" stored on the memory card. The information in the order includes the pictures to be printed and the number of copies of each picture.

■ WITH DATE [/ WITHOUT DATE

To modify the DPOF print order, select PRINT ORDER (DPOF) in the playback menu and press the selector up or down to highlight WITH DATE or WITHOUT DATE.



WITH DATE : Print date of recording on pictures.

WITHOUT DATE: Print pictures without date.

Press MENU/OK and follow the steps below.

1 Press the selector left or right to display a picture you wish to include in or remove from the print order.



2 Press the selector up or down to choose the number of copies (up to 99). To remove a picture from the order, press the selector down until the number of copies is 0.

3 Repeat steps 1–2 to complete the print order. Press **MENU/OK** to save the print order when settings are complete, or **DISP/BACK** to exit without changing the print order.



4 The total number of prints is displayed in the monitor. Press **MENU/ OK** to exit.



The pictures in the current print order are indicated by a icon during playback.



■ RESET ALL

To cancel the current print RESET DPOFOK? order, select **RESET ALL** for PRINT ORDER (DPOF). The confirmation shown at right will be displayed; press MENU/OK to remove all pictures from the order.




- Print orders can contain a maximum of 999 pictures.
- ▶ If a memory card is inserted RESET OPOF OK? containing a print order created by another camera, the message shown at right will be displayed. Pressing MENU/OK ORD YES OF NO cancels the print order; a new print order must be created as described above.



Viewing Pictures on TV

To show pictures to a group, connect the camera to a TV using an HDMI cable (available separately from third-party suppliers; note that the TV can only be used for playback, not shooting).

- 1 Turn the camera off.
- 2 Connect the cable as shown below.



- Be sure the connectors are fully inserted.
- **3** Tune the television to the HDMI input channel. See the documentation supplied with the television for details.
- **4** Turn the camera on and press **b** button. The camera monitor turns off and pictures and movies are played back on the TV. Note that the camera volume controls have no effect on sounds played on the TV; use the television volume controls to adjust the volume.
 - The USB cable can not be used while an HDMI cable is connected.
 - Some televisions may briefly display a black screen when movie playback begins.

EF-42: This clip-on flash unit (powered by four AA batteries) has a Guide Number of 42/137 (ISO 100, m/ft.) and supports TTL flash control and auto power zoom in the range 24–105 mm (35 mm format equivalent). The flash head can be rotated 90° up, 180° left, or 120° right for bounce lighting.




EF-X20: This clip-on flash unit has a Guide Number of 20/65 (ISO 100, m/ft.).



Leather cases

BLC-XE1: This leather case, exclusively for use with the X-E1, combines practicality with the luxury of leather and comes with a shoulder strap made of the same material, as well as a cloth that can be used to wrap the camera before putting it in the case and on other occasions. Pictures can be taken and batteries and memory cards inserted or removed with the camera still in its case.



Caring for the Camera

To ensure continued enjoyment of the product, observe the following precautions.

Storage and Use

If the camera will not be used for an extended period, remove the battery and memory card. Do not store or use the camera in locations that are:

- exposed to rain, steam, or smoke
- very humid or extremely dusty
- exposed to direct sunlight or very high temperatures, such as in a closed vehicle on a sunny day
- extremely cold
- subject to strong vibration
- exposed to strong magnetic fields, such as near a broadcasting antenna, power line, radar emitter, motor, transformer, or magnet
- in contact with volatile chemicals such as pesticides
- next to rubber or vinyl products

■ Water and Sand

Exposure to water and sand can also damage the camera and its internal circuitry and mechanisms. When using the camera at the beach or seaside, avoid exposing the camera to water or sand. Do not place the camera on a wet surface.

■ Condensation

Sudden increases in temperature, such as occur when entering a heated building on a cold day, can cause condensation inside the camera. If this occurs, turn the camera off and wait an hour before turning it on again. If condensation forms on the memory card, remove the card and wait for the condensation to dissipate.


<u>Traveling</u>

Keep the camera in your carry-on baggage. Checked baggage may suffer violent shocks that could damage the camera.

Cleaning the Image Sensor

Multiple photographs marred by spots or blotches in identical locations may indicate the presence of dust on the camera image sensor. Clean the sensor using the **SENSOR CLEANING** option in the setup menu (**Sensor** 85); if the problem persists, you can clean the sensor manually as described below. Note that there will be a charge to repair or replace the image sensor if it is damaged during cleaning.

1 Use a blower (not a brush) to remove dust from the sensor.



- ① Do not use a brush or blower brush. Failure to observe this precaution could damage the sensor.
- 2 Check whether the dust has been successfully removed.
 - Repeat Steps 1 and 2 as necessary.
- **3** Replace the body cap or lens.

Appendix

Glossary

Exif Print: A standard for storing information with pictures for optimal color reproduction during printing.

HDMI (High-**D**efinition **M**ultimedia **I**nterface): An interface standard for the transmission of images and sound that adds audio input to the DVI interface used to connect computers to displays.

JPEG (Joint Photographic Experts Group): A compressed file format for color images. The higher the compression rate, the greater the loss of information and more noticeable drop in quality when the picture is displayed.

MOV: A movie file format (extension ".mov") developed by Apple, Inc., and viewed using QuickTime Player. This format is popular on the Internet.

White balance: The human brain automatically adapts to changes in the color of light, with the result that objects that appear white under one light source still appear white when the color of the light source changes. Digital cameras can mimic this adjustment by processing images according to the color of the light source. This process is known as "white balance."

Memory Card Capacity

The following table shows the recording time or number of pictures available at different image sizes. All figures are approximate; file size varies with the scene recorded, producing wide variations in the number of files that can be stored. The number of exposures or length remaining may not diminish at an even rate.
